This include documentation writers, translators, testers, artists, interaction designers, marketeers, and more.

In the Ubuntu project, we have worked hard to build and embrace a culture of diversity and to welcome anyone with a burning desire to contribute and figure out a way in which they can get involved, whatever skills they possess. This has resulted in an explosion of teams in our community – little sub-

## LoCo Teams For Local Change

Of all these sub-communities in the Ubuntu world, one of the fastest growing and most exciting are our Ubuntu Local Community (LoCo) teams [1]. These are local Ubuntu user groups that get together to help spread the word about Ubuntu in their local area, provide support for their members, organize events, put together open days and installfests, and more. We have more than 200 LoCo teams and they never cease to surprise me in just what they manage to achieve.

One such story that we showcased recently on the Ubuntu Fridge was the New Mexico Ubuntu LoCo Team [2], which persuaded the Charter Bank of Albuquerque to donate 25 used computers that were provided to the Endorphin Power Company (EPC), a non-profit organization dedicated to improving the lives of people, with special focus on those who are substance-dependent and homeless. It didn't take them long to get up and running:

Working as a true team, the New Mexico folks set up a page for the project in the Ubuntu wiki, defining milestones and getting organized through their mailing list. The first big milestone in the culmination of this amazing effort came in February 2008, where they met to install and set up some of the workstations in the EPC computer lab. Of course, with the operating system we all know and love. That installation was a success, and provided a solid foundation to base the subsequent efforts on.

Fast forward 2009: a functional Ubuntu network at EPC, wi-fi, a wealth of side-projects, ideas for other initiatives, regular updates on the project, negotiation of a support and training agreement, and the satisfaction of doing a good job while having fun and helping others. [3]

This story is just one of hundreds and hundreds of similar stories that I have heard over the years from our incredible LoCo Teams. They convey tales of real people working together and sharing their skills and passion to bring the spirit and ethos of Ubuntu to their local area, and stories like this are an inspiration to us all.
